And then there's parents and volunteers sharing their time in moving everything out and then back into classrooms. Not to mention moving the K5 from the lower level to the upper level and the K4 from the upper to the lower level. It was something to behold!!!

And all of that was just to get to the point where teachers could get into their new rooms and create an exciting environment for the students. The extra time and energy necessary to figure out where to store everything in new places and spaces was a huge giving of self by our staff...thanks to every teacher and aide for all of the added time in planning (and lost sleep in worrying).

This year's theme, "Let Us Build a House Where Love Can Grow", certainly refers to much more than all of the work that was accomplished this summer. The physical spaces that have been renovated are simply the places where the Gospel message is proclaimed and lived.

With our new pastor, we will be looking for other ways to continue to build the Kingdom of God in our community and beyond. Some of you may recall our efforts in the past in building classrooms at Sagrada Familia (our sister parish in the Dominican Republic). We may want to do more this year.

During the 2016-17 school year, we will be preparing for an Accreditation Team Visit next year. This year will involve teachers and the community in preparing a self-study. We will be evaluating many areas of our school, seeking input, and gathering documentation. During the summer, I included bulletin columns which summarized the many areas which will be studied. There are two extra inservice days this year to provide additional time to complete the self-study process.

Throughout the new school year, 275 students will be supported by parents and teachers in creating opportunities for growth. I again ask each parent to prayerfully consider signing up for something extra on this year's Volunteer Sign-Up Form. In the past, there have been several parents who have always stepped forward to make things happen for everyone. The gift of time is so precious for everyone and by bringing together many people for a project, the time to accomplish something is decreased for all....please give a little to the cause!

Every once in a while, I hear someone comment that the office entrance is never locked. I just want people to be aware that we unlock the inner doors at the beginning of the day and also at dismissal time for obvious reasons. Mrs. Rychtik usually notices visitors and unlocks the inner doors before they can get there. In the past, we have also unlocked the doors during high traffic times such as recess and K4 half-day dismissal. This has given the impression that the entrance is never secure. Moving forward, inner doors will be unlocked only at the beginning and end of the school day.

Don't forget to pick up Family Packets this weekend in the church basement and turn in Calendar of Ca\$h tickets (at the school office)! The start of the 2016-17 marks the beginning of some wonderful opportunities to build upon the foundation of the past with new energy and enthusiasm as together we create a place where God's love can grow.

family packets available august 20-21

The hectic summer (at least around here) of 2016 is about to be a fading memory as students (and parents) get excited about the beginning of a new school year and the promise of continued hot weather(?).

There will be the typical deluge of information, known as the Beginning of the Year Family Packet, and the “everything you need to know” packets will be available on August 20th and 21st. Parents will be able find their packet of information in the church hall after all Masses.

If you are planning to be out of town on the weekend or if you belong to another parish, you can also pick up the Family Packet from the school office beginning August 22nd.

It is important that each family receives the information in the packet and returns the necessary forms during the Family Open House (August 28th) or on the first day of school (August 30th).

We really appreciate the cooperation from Holy Angels families as we sort and gather student and family data at the beginning of the year. If you're one of the families that promptly gets this information back to us, please know that you make our work much easier!

When returning forms on August 28th, parents should simply drop the entire packet of returns in the box located at the intersection of the main and office hallways. They will be separated later by the office staff and volunteers. This process will help reduce congestion during the morning Open House.

Please do NOT turn in lunch money at the Open House. Also, see the related article for more information on this year's lunch program and the milk program.

“new” parents to gather on august 24th

There will be a special parent meeting on Wednesday evening, August 24th. The gathering is an opportunity for parents who are new to Holy Angels (and those with a first child entering K5) to get a better feel for what to expect with the start of school.

Principal Mike Sternig will explain some parts of the Family Handbook and parents will get a preview of the first days of the 2016-17 school year. Parents will also have an opportunity to simply ask questions about the Holy Angels School curriculum as well as programs and activities offered at HA.

The informal meeting will be held in the Walnut Room (enter on 8th Avenue) beginning at 6:00pm and will probably last about an hour (there's a School Committee meetings at 7:00pm). At least one parent should try to attend this informative session. Parents are asked to bring the Beginning-of-the-Year Packet to the gathering. Please R.S.V.P. by calling the school office by August 23rd.

aug. 28: school year begins with open house

Preparations for the 2016-17 school year are almost complete and they include more than just the facilities. The annual Beginning-of-the-Year Family Open House will again be held on a Sunday morning...August 28th, from 10:30am until 12:30pm. At the conclusion of the 9:30 Mass, principal Mike Sternig will hurry over to open the doors of school! There will be a brief Opening Prayer outside of the Office Entrance.

There will be a staggered Open House for the K3 and K4 programs. The families of K4 students (located on the lower level near the Walnut Room) are asked to come to the Open House between 10:30 and 11:15am, and K3 student to the K3 classroom (near the Cedar Room) between 11:30 and 12:30pm.

Students will have a chance to find their new classrooms and lockers, drop off school supplies, meet teachers and other friends, and catch up on the latest news. Parents also have the chance to spend time comparing notes and planning for the upcoming school year.

Classes begin on Tuesday, August 30th, for all students in grades K5 through 8. Students in the K4 program begin on August 31st, and K3 begins on September 1st.

faith hope and run: a community event

The second annual Faith, Hope and Run event will be held on Sunday, September 18th, at Regner Park.. Hosted by Holy Angels, Holy Trinity (Newburg), St. Mary's and St. Frances Cabrini, the faith and family festival will benefit the Casa Guadalupe Education Center in West Bend.

There will be a 1/4 mile kids run and a 5K run/walk starting at 1:15pm, followed by children's games. Food and beverages will be served from 11:30am until 6:30pm.

parents to gather for classroom experience

A special night just for parents is being planned for the start of the school year. Parent-in-the-Classroom Night will give parents an opportunity to meet with teachers to experience a student's day at Holy Angels.

We will be holding two separate Parent-in-the-Classroom Nights...On Thursday, September 8th, beginning at 6:00pm in the gym, parents of students in grades K3 through 5 are invited to gather for a general session, followed by an information session in their child's classroom. Teachers will talk about the curriculum for the year, ways parents can get involved, and general expectations of students. Classroom teachers will repeat their presentation so that parents with more than one child can (hopefully) meet with all of their children's teachers.

On Monday, September 12th (no Packer game!), the parents of junior high students will have the chance to scurry around the building like their children do each day, meeting with several different teachers. The evening will also begin at 6:00pm in the gym with a presentation for junior high parents, followed by "a mini-day in the life of a junior high student", concluding around 8:30pm.

come and go process provides safety and speed

The before-school and after-school arrivals and departures of students can be a safety nightmare or a dream come true. With the cooperation of **all** parents and a dose of patience, we are able to provide a circle of safety for students as they arrive and leave each day. Here's a rundown of the rest of the plan:

arrivals K5-8...

Most of the Holy Angels parents make sure that their students arrive at school after 7:25am (bus students may arrive earlier) when playground supervision is present. Many students begin the day by simply getting in line or talking with friends. Unlike the other recess times, the presence of so many students on the playground at the same time creates space problems. Therefore, we ask that students arrive as close to the 7:33am bell as possible. Remember: this year's school day begins at 7:45am!!!

When arriving by car, the safest place to drop off students is on Ninth Avenue, close to the gate near the playground equipment. The gate at the intersection of Ninth and Elm is closed to students in the morning (they are directed to the gate near the playground equipment).

arrivals K3/K4...

In the morning, the Cedar Street parking lot is reserved for faculty parking and parents of K3/K4 students (when they walk their child to the K3 or K4 classroom). In the past, we have experienced problems when other parents have tried to use the Cedar Street lot. Please do NOT use the Cedar Street parking lot as a general drop-off area...it is reserved for K3/K4 students.

departures...

As in the past, the dismissal pickup plan includes two areas: 9th Avenue and 8th Avenue. The area on the east side of 9th Avenue seems to be the more popular. To reduce congestion when the street is full, cars should pull onto the playground to circle and await an open space on 9th. Drivers should move as far to the north on 9th Avenue as possible when there is space. Students are directed to await pickup at the curb. Students should stay behind the yellow line until the car stops.



This plan really works well when everyone follows the procedure. Problems arise when parents try to have students get into the car on the playground (it's safer to have all students wait at the curb). With everyone's cooperation, all students are usually able to be picked up before 3:00pm.

The area along the west side of 8th Avenue has also worked well for many families as the after school pickup spot. However, it is necessary to remind parents to continue to wait until AFTER all busses have departed before using 8th Avenue.

Thanks to everyone for their patience.

The Cedar Street Parking lot should NOT be used to pick up students at the end of the school day. The congestion combined with students walking through the area is DANGEROUS. Please do not use this area at the end of the school day.

The playground and the playground equipment areas are closed at the end of the school day. One reason is simply that students should be looking for their rides and be ready to get-in-and-go when their ride arrives. Waiting for students to finish play really messes up the pick-up process for everyone. Thanks for your understanding regarding this situation.

has-pac...activities for parents

Do you have great ideas to get the kids and families of Holy Angels together? Do you want to be involved in fun activities like the Trunk or Treat in October or Spirit Celebration to kick off Catholic Schools Week; then the Parent Activities Committee (PAC) is the scene for you.

PAC is in need of new members to help plan, coordinate and invent fun and exciting activities for the Holy Angels School community. Many of our current member's children are graduating in the next few years, and new ideas and new faces are what we are looking for. Current PAC activities include the Trunk or Treat, Spirit Celebration, and Teacher Appreciation Week...but as a PAC member you do not need to work on each activity. If this all sounds like a fun way to be involved at Holy Angels, then come and see what a great committee with great people PAC is. All are welcome!!

Meetings will be held as necessary to plan each event (for those who are planning that particular event). There is more information about PAC in the Beginning-of-the-Year Packet.

return calendar of ca\$h tickets...soon

In an effort to process all of the Calendar of Ca\$h raffle tickets before the first drawing on August 30th, parents are asked to return tickets and money as soon as possible. The committee will be processing returns during the Open House. Returns should be sent by mail or dropped off at the school office. The office is open during regular school hours. THANK YOU!

milk available for a fee; choices of flavors

If your children are taking milk this year, please return the milk order (along with other forms) by August 28th. That way, we can make sure that your child will be on the class milk list on the very first day of school (it also saves us the time and hassle of constantly updating milk lists for the teacher after school starts). You'll find the milk order form along with many other items on the gold-colored sheet in the Beginning-of-the-Year Packet (please cut!).



The state requires that the milk program maintains a separate account for milk program expenses. In the past, we offered milk without charge in order to draw down a surplus in the milk account. This year, there will again be a charge of \$8.00/student for milk (\$5.00 for the K3/K4 program). We offer choices of 1% (white) and fat-free (chocolate) milk.

We will continue to support parents with concerns regarding the nutritional value of chocolate milk. On the milk order form, parents can indicate that their child/ren should only receive white milk for their lunch. The request will be noted on the milk listing use for recording daily consumption.

fighting disease with vaccinations

There has been a continuing effort to upgrade the immunization requirements of students in Wisconsin schools. Rules have been established so that, over time, all students meet the same requirements.

Parents of students entering the K5 program are reminded that immunization standards require a second varicella (chickenpox) vaccination prior to entry into kindergarten. Parents must provide one of the following: 1) dates of varicella vaccination; or 2) an indication that the child has a history of chickenpox and year; or 3) a waiver for health, religious or personal conviction reasons.

Students entering 6th grade also need one dose of tetanus, diphtheria and acellular pertussis vaccine (Tdap). The completed immunization record and other physical exam forms should be handed in during Family Open House.

The Wisconsin immunization laws also include a Hepatitis B (HepB) and measles, mumps and rubella (MMR) vaccine for all students. Children need 3 doses of the HepB vaccine and 2 doses of the MMR vaccine to be fully immunized.

At the present time there are no requirements associated with influenza vaccines, however, parents should check with their family doctor if this is a concern.



“in house” lunch program continues

For the past several years, Kathy Staehler has coordinated the hot lunch program. Mrs. Staehler will return again with menus that provide both nutrition that students need and taste that students want. She will again be assisted by part-time staff member Lenore Michaud.

Volunteers for lunch tickets and serving continue to have an important role in making the hot lunch program work (see message below!) . The program provides students with a quality hot lunch with a variety of menus and nutritious options. The program has also been self-sustaining financially.

In projecting the budget for the upcoming school year, there will be a slight increase in the price per meal. The price for grades K5-8 will be \$2.95 per meal, \$14.75 per 5-punch ticket, and \$29.50 per 10-punch ticket. Lunch money should be sent to school in an envelope with the student's name, room number and the words: *Lunch Money*. Make checks payable to: *Holy Angels School*. Students should give their lunch money envelope to their homeroom teacher during homeroom period. Parents are urged to keep a record of hot lunches taken on their Hot Lunch Menu and to purchase additional tickets as anticipated during the year.

For older students with an insatiable hunger around 12:30 each day, a special meal deal is again being offered. Junior high students will be able to purchase a second helping of the main entree for only \$1.00...our own “dollar menu”. Here's how it works: If students want the second helping at lunch, they inform their homeroom teacher when the hot lunch count is taken. When they get their regular lunch ticket punched, they pay \$1.00 and receive a special ticket for the second helping. After everyone has gone through the lunch line once, only those who requested a second helping in the morning with the lunch count will be able to get seconds. Students must purchase a full hot lunch in order to purchase the “dollar menu”.

From time to time, students may not realize that they have run out of punches (see above suggestion) or a lunch gets misplaced. A hot lunch ticket will be provided in case of an emergency with parents being contacted for reimbursement. We want students to have a good lunch. Students will be issued a maximum of four emergency tickets for the year and this has usually been enough.

The Family Handbook includes a listing of suggested items for a nutritious snack and lunch. The Hot Lunch program will “provide a balance among protein, grain, fruit and vegetables, and dairy food groups throughout the month and limit dessert offerings”.

Parents are urged to refer to the Wellness Policy (#5140.4) in the Family Handbook for Healthy Snack Options. Water bottles are permitted within the classroom during the school day, as long as the practice does not interfere with the educational process. Water bottles should be non-metallic and unbreakable. They should not exceed 8 inches in height.

When provided, birthday treats should be limited to items on the Healthy Snack Options list. Treats should not require refrigeration.

We have made it through our third year of the independent Holy Angels Hot Lunch Program and I am glad to say that we continued to stay in the black and this program paid for itself. We could not have accomplished this without the support of all the wonderful volunteers who help make this program run smoothly.

As we start a new school year I will again be looking for volunteers to help with the Hot Lunch Program. I will need Ticket Makers/Takers (11:00-12:30) and Servers (11:30-12:30)...one or two days a month is all it takes. All it takes is one day a month and it would be the same day every month (example - first Monday of every month). Remember, lunchtime is a great time to see your student or grand-student in action.

after-school programming for kids

Holy Angels will again team up with the Kettle Moraine YMCA in providing an after-school day care program for Holy Angels families. Because of the level of interest, this year's program will only be offered at Holy Angels (with activity trips to the Y). Holy Angels students will again be able to stay right here (in the Cedar Room) and continue to be able to utilize many of the opportunities available at the Y.

The cost for Kids Connection is still only \$9 per day, which include a snack, Youth Fit for Life program, swim lessons and activities at the Y. Part time enrollment (3 days a week) is available. Students enrolled full time (4 or 5 days per week) will receive a FREE YMCA Youth Membership, or the value can be applied to a Family Membership. medication forms: a “must have” for administering

Each year, there are many students who take medication for a variety of reasons. The Family Handbook explains the procedure regarding the administration of medication to students which specifies the completion of a “Medication Administration” form, which should be sent to the school office along with the medication.

At times, parents have sent non-prescription medications (and in some cases, prescription medications) with only a note asking to have the medication be given to a student. Due to state laws, we may administer or dispense medication ONLY when accompanied by a completed Medication Administration form. Therefore, simple notes from parents will not be adequate for the administration or dispensing of medications. Also, all medications must be sent to the school office in their original container. We regret that we have to follow such a “tight” policy and hope that parents understand that the new state laws are intended to protect our children.

A Medication Administration form will be included in the Family Packet. One side is for prescription medication and MUST be signed by a physician. The other side is for non-prescription medication and may simply be signed by the parent. Forms are also available in the links section of the school website.

Again, without the proper authorization provided through the completed Medication Administration form, we will not be able to administer or dispense medication. Please note that parents may always administer medications to their children at school without completed school forms. Classroom teachers may not administer medications. Finally, students are not allowed to have medication (including inhalers) in their possession, unless they have written approval from the principal.



student cell phones require permission

Cellular phones and other communication devices continue to be more commonplace in today's society. Like most technologies, their use can be beneficial or they can create problems. Family Handbook 5142.2 indicates that cell phones are not allowed in school unless written permission has been given. A new request must be made each year.

Generally this only occurs when a parent requests for a student to have a cell phone available for after-school communications. This is understandable and is usually not a problem. We agree that parents should be able to have contact with their child and this has always been available through the school office. Problems can arise when students use their own cell phone to make arrangements with parents (and others) without the awareness of school personnel who are responsible for students during the school day.

According to the handbook, cell phones must be “off” during the school day and stored in the student's locker inside a back pack or given to the homeroom teacher during homeroom period. Students may not carry cell phones or other personal AV materials during the school day. Cell phones may only be used during the school day in the presence and at the direction of a teacher or administrator.

Cell phones found on school grounds during the school day or those being used by students during the school day without permission (and in the presence of a teacher) will be confiscated.

Student-owned i-pods, i-pads, and other application-supporting electronic devices are not allowed in school unless written permission from a teacher is obtained for a specific instructional purpose. However, junior high students will be using personal Chromebooks as an instructional tool in their classrooms.



scrip: easy money for parents and school

The Scrip program continues to provide many families with a terrific way to decrease their tuition payments. It has also helped to provide needed funds for the Instructional Budget. For those who are not familiar with Scrip, here's a quick summary: Gift certificates for area businesses are purchased at the face value of the certificate. Holy Angels keeps a percentage of the price...simple! For example, you can purchase a gas card for \$100 which is good for \$100 worth of gas; Holy Angels keeps \$5 and passes on the rest. Parents can designate that a portion of the profit be applied to their family tuition...what a great deal!

Many parish members took advantage of summertime availability of Scrip cards after Mass. Many thanks to the volunteers who made the program available each week! Scrip cards are better than buying a gift card at one of those store kiosks...Holy Angels and parents get the profit! Scrip can also be purchased online. It's easy and convenient. band continues to grow and improve

Dr. Walter Rich returns to Holy Angels as the director of the Holy Angels Band program for another year of great musical opportunities. Over the past three years, there has been an increase in participation and a noted improvement in the performances by the band. The 2016-17 school year will again provide opportunities for individual lessons during the school day and participation in a combined band with students from the other West Bend Catholic schools. Students in grades four through eight are eligible to participate in the band program. Events such as participating in a band clinic, a winter or spring public performance, performances at area retirement homes, and more are in the planning stages.

With Dr. Rich's extensive background as an instructor and conductor, we are hopeful that there will continue to be an increased interest in the band program. Information about joining the band program at school can be found in upcoming Friday Folders. At the beginning of the school year, Dr. Rich will meet with some of the music classes to give students an opportunity to learn more about band instruments (and try some out!).

chorus/bells members to delay start

Because of the resignation of music teacher, Mrs. Scheit, the Holy Angels Chorus will delay the start of its season. Likewise, the Holy Angels Bells will begin at a later date.

areas for assistance and involvement

Each year, the Family Beginning-of-the-Year Packet includes a form for parents interested in helping in one (or more) of the many activities which are made possible because of adult volunteers. Here are a few areas where help is needed...

playground...

The lunch hour is a special time when volunteers are in great need. Playground Supervisors help in providing a safe playground for all of our students. Playground Supervisors sign up for eight noon hours during the school year. There are three supervisors each lunch hour to provide coverage of all areas of the playground. This year, we'll continue to have a Lead Supervisor to help alert parents to situations of concern from the previous day and to improve communications with classroom teachers regarding incidents.

development...

The Development Committee has really provided support in many areas of the school. Most of their work is accomplished through small action groups which focus on one or two activities during the year. There is a need for: parents to get involved in one of the action groups such as recruitment, public relations, or grant writing, as well as parents to get involved with the Parent Activities Committee (PAC).

health room...

The Health Room is also staffed by volunteers during the noon recess. The usually quiet Health Room does have its moments when a bandage, ice pack or a little TLC is needed to help an injured student. We are in need of many more volunteers to help in the Health Room (First Aid training is available for volunteers).

picture day coming...practice smiling

Although the annual Picture Day is still several weeks away, students can practice smiling and brighten the day for everyone they meet. Students in grades K4 through seven will have their pictures taken on Friday, September 23rd. K3 students and anyone who was absent will have pictures taken on Tuesday, September 27th.

Eighth grade graduation pictures will be taken on Thursday, January 5th.

calling all absentees (*before 8:15 please*)

Student safety is always an important issue at Holy Angels. When a student is missing during the morning homeroom period, someone in the class will usually tell the teacher that so-and-so is sick or at a funeral or something else. As the absentee list arrives at the office, Mrs. Rychtik checks it against the parent contacts received and usually we know why each student is absent.

Parents are a tremendous help by reporting student absences by 8:15am each day a child is sick.
