Greetings!

Summer is here and it sure feels like the end of the school year suddenly happened with seemingly little warning. It was really great to see so many Holy Angels School families involved in so many aspects of the festival. Thanks for your involvement in this parish event...it is certainly evidence that there is a connection between our school and parish life.

Looking back over the year, many thanks also to all of the parents who have made so many things possible through their generous giving of time! There were many new parents stepping forward and participating in new ways for the benefit of our school community. That's what makes this school so special!

The topic of volunteers comes up often, most notably when there aren't enough and it's the "same people" who always are willing to give of their time. In grades four and five, Jody Bender and Chris Thelen will coordinate support in reading, language arts and math with Kristin Walker, and enrichment with Patty Arndt.

Speaking of changes, this summer will again become a challenge for the maintenance crew as they do much more than "just" taking care of the floors and general cleaning. The 21st Century Classroom Project is stretching everyone as we move on to the library, computer lab and more (see related article). I'll be getting word out for help in moving desks and furnishings during the summer.

Many thanks to Amy Dahlberg and Chad Wohlt for their service as part of the School Committee. Their enthusiasm and perspectives will be missed. Joining the committee will be Rachel Weber and Ken Dorow. The committee will again be chaired next year by Gary Held.

Thanks to all who have already "planted" a West Bend Catholic Schools yard sign. I'm still hoping to see more around town (and even outside the city limits) with the Holy Angels logo on it. If you don't have one yet, please pick up a sign at church and display it in your neighborhood.

My hope is that parents will always be the primary recruiters that our school needs so that we can continue to efficiently utilize our resources. ## mark your calendar for important 18-19 dates

Family Packets for the 2018-19 school year will be available after the weekend Masses on August 18th and 19th in the church basement. The Beginning of the Year Open House will again be held on Sunday morning, August 26th from 10:30 until 12:30 am. The first day of school for all students in K5 through 8 is Tuesday, August 28th. The K4 Program will begin on Wednesday, August 29th and the K3 Program will start on Thursday, August 30th.

There is a professional development day on Thursday, October 4th, for Sustaining the Mission. On Friday, October 5th, teachers will be attending the bi-annual Archdiocesan Educators' Convention.

The Parent-Student-Teacher Conferences will be held in the evening on Tuesday, November 6th and Thursday, November 8th. On Friday, November 9th, there will be classes in the morning and P/S/T Conferences in the afternoon.

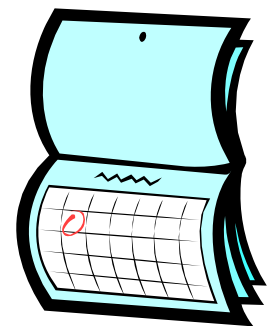
Thanksgiving Break will be from November 21st through November 25th. At Christmas, we are planning Friday, December 21st for classroom lunch celebrations and an all-school assembly/prayer service at the end of the day. Christmas vacation will begin at dismissal on the 21st with classes resuming on Wednesday, January 2nd. There is no school on Monday, January 21st (end of semester). There is another professional development day on February 15th with teachers from Washington and Dodge counties gathering.

Ash Wednesday falls on March 6th and Holy Angels will again coincide with the public school calendar for the spring break which will be at the end of March (25th through 29th). There is no school on Good Friday (April 19th) and Easter Monday (April 22nd).

Graduation is planned for ...wait for it...May 31st. The school year ends on June 4th (just in time for the HA Festival).

Finally, this year's Parent in the Classroom Nights will be important evenings for parents to connect with classroom teachers regarding the upcoming school year. There will be separate Nights for grades K3 through 5 (Thursday, September 6th) and for junior high (Monday, September 10th).

Please make note of all of the above dates on your family calendar. Families are encouraged to plan vacations during the summer or other breaks in the instructional calendar. Although vacationing the week before or after a break may avoid crowds, extended time away from school can create learning difficulties for students.



## policy revisions and numbering for 2018-19

The final School Committee meeting of the year saw the approval of very few changes in the Family Handbook. For the most part, the changes were minor or were simply clarifications or restatements of present processes and procedures.

The tuition schedule was updated to reflect information previously communicated to parents. The hot lunch price for the upcoming school year will be \$3.10 per lunch.

There is also a clarification in the Dress Code – General (5132.1) policy. In part it reads...

*Shorts and culottes may be worn from May 1st until October 1st. On other days when the temperature is expected to exceed 80 degrees, the administrator may issue a variance in the no-shorts rule. Shorts which are not of reasonable length, spandex and cut-offs are considered to be inappropriate. Shorts, skirts, or skirts should be cut no higher than the end of the fingertips when the student is standing and the arm is extended naturally along the side.* This will provide the option of shorts on other warmer days.

There are also several policies which have been added to reflect the revised Archdiocesan Policies. They include revisions for suspension and expulsion. There is a greater expressed concern regarding concussions which is covered with policy revisions. There are also more clarifications regarding the expectations for using technology in the school setting.

Finally, many of the policy numbers are being changed to coordinate with the revised Archdiocesan policies. Parents are asked to carefully review the Family Handbook when they receive it at the beginning of the school year. Revisions will also be posted later on the school website.

## planning continues for students in 2018-19

Planning for the 2018-19 school year has been progressing well. Registrations have been returned (big thanks!), textbooks are being ordered (just starting!), classroom supplies have been requisitioned by the teachers, and several new portable classroom cabinets which match the new classroom cabinetry have finally arrived.

Based on the current registrations, Holy Angels School is anticipating an enrollment for the upcoming school year of about 250 students. Next year's eighth grade will be the last of the two class grades for the foreseeable future.. All of the other grades will be single classes. We anticipate a K5 class of about 20 students.

The K4 program will continue to offer a half-day and full-day option for the 17 students who have already enrolled for the Monday/Wednesday/Friday program. The K3 half-day program will continue to meet on Tuesday/Thursday and there is still some room in that program.

For the upcoming school year, Holy Angels will continue to support a 1-to-1 ratio for technology availability in grades one through eight. For K3/K4/K5, several iPads are available for classroom learning stations. In grades one through three, there are enough iPads for each student to use as part of their learning experience. In grades four and five, Chromebooks continue to be provided for use in the classroom. Junior high students are required to have a Chromebook which they use at school and at home as part of their normal learning process.

This time of year is a wonderful opportunity to invite other new families to consider being part of the Holy Angels Parish community. If you have new neighbors during the summer months who might be interested in joining our community, pass the good word! They can contact the parish or school office for more information.

## laufer memorial awarded at closing liturgy

The Noreen A. Laufer Memorial was established by the staff to honor a colleague who died following a battle with cancer. Each year, it is presented to a first through seventh grade student at the closing liturgy and is "awarded to the students of Holy Angels who regularly exhibit a positive attitude and touch the lives of others around them."

The recipient of the 2018 Laufer Memorial award was Evan Waech. His name was chosen from several students nominated by the teaching staff. In her presentation, Mrs. Hammen shared a description of Evan which certainly provided a glimpse of the attributes of a happy, positive Holy Angels student.

## living the spirit...service to others

Part of our Student Mission Statement reminds us that we are gathered together to serve others. One of the goals of Holy Angels School is to help students develop a spirit of service. As we tried to welcome the Spirit this year, acts of service were part of our living in God's Spirit.

The primary students and teachers worked with Family Promise to host a Christmas Party and provide the children with presents. They also participated in a prayer walk during Lent in support of Big Brothers/Big Sisters. Second graders and their Buddies wrote thank you cards to members of the military.



Intermediate students created posters for the West Bend community's celebration and recognition of veterans at MPTC; the HA Chorus also sang at the event (as well as Enchantment in the Park). The students collected winter clothing and blankets for St. Ben's. They also created door decorations for area assisted living communities. If you ever wonder who is responsible for all of those ornaments on the Giving Tree each Advent...that would be our fifth graders.

Junior high students provided hygiene boxes for St. Ben's and also Thanksgiving boxes for the House of Peace. Sixth graders provided food for the Cathedral's outreach program. The seventh graders made the seasons a little more cheery with decorations for the Cedar Community. During their Ash Wednesday retreat,

students made cards and rosaries for the sick and homebound.

All-school Mass collections helped to provide support for several outreach projects in the community: Family Promise, La Sagrada Familia (our sister parish in the Dominican Republic), St. Ben's, Watts of Love, American Red Cross, Habitat for Humanity, Children's Hospital, Full Shelf Food Pantry, and St. Vincent de Paul Society. The Great Lakes Hemophilia Foundation was also supported.

The HAS-HOPE service club was active in the community as Salvation Army bell ringers, serving at St. Ben's, Visiting Ivy Manor, helping at Enchantment in the Park and Family Promise, supporting the Washington County Humane Society, and spring cleaning the HA grounds, among other things!

## battle of the books...blue team comeback

The annual Battle of the Accelerated Readers began with another challenging opening round. Contestants first tried to answer some really tough questions posed by Mrs. Mitchell which were submitted by Holy Angels readers and they were followed by general questions about popular books in a library.

Unlike last year's battle which saw the White Team accumulate 104 points to the Blue Team's 52, this year's competition was a bit more interesting. The White Team held a slim 56-52 lead after the first round. However, the Blue Team roared back in the second round to win this year's Battle 96-72.

The Battle participants were the top point earners for each grade. # supplies needed for new school year

The School Supply List is usually attached to the summer Family Newsletter. Since we've gone "green" with the Newsletter and menus being sent via email and posted on the school website, the listing of school supplies for the 2018-2019 school year is also paperless. It can be found on the school website education links section.

As expected, there are a few changes in some grades. Because students consume (sometimes literally) pencils, red pencils, pens at different rates, parents should simply make sure that replacements are readily available at home when needed. Students do not need to have a dozen pencils in the desk or supply box.

In the past couple of years, the "one or more reams of copy paper" on the Supply List has really helped in providing copy paper for about half of the year...thank you! Items on the Supply List can be brought to school on August 26th, when students report for the Open House.

This is a reminder that, for safety reasons, backpacks must fit in the student's locker when not in use. Since we replaced lockers last summer with larger units, this has been less of an issue. (In addition, we did not hear of any reports of students getting stuck in their locker!)

For book covers, grocery bags work very well and are environmentally friendly and we will also have a supply of Holy Angels book covers available at the Open House.

As in the past, all students in grades three through eight will be using a standard Holy Angels Student Assignment Book. The form for grades three through five has a separate page for each day and areas for each subject. The junior high form is a little different with scriptural passages and information about saints.

We continue to emphasize good study habits and organizational skills and teachers will start the year by helping students to learn how to effectively use the Assignment Book. Students will be able to pick up their Assignment Book at the Beginning of School Open House on August 26th. The cost is \$5.00 per Assignment Book which can be paid to the homeroom teacher at the Open House.

Students in grades seven and eight will continue to use the New American Bible; students may bring their own if they already have this version. Sixth graders will again be receiving a Bible from the parish during a special service in September and do not need to purchase a Bible.

Junior high students will need to provide their own Chromebooks as noted in the past. The minimum Chromebook configuration must include: Google Chrome OS; wireless network capability (802.11a/b/g/n); 2GB RAM and 16GB memory; USB port; and 11.5 inch screen. There are many models which meet these criteria. Refurbished Chromebooks are often better tested than new ones.

## ar program challenges students to read

This Accelerated Reader Program encourages student to access good literature and challenges them to earn points as they read. According to program coordinator Sharon Mitchell, this year was a whopping 17,105 points (compared to last year's 15,474 points)!

Leading the way were the fifth and seventh grades. The seventh graders led with 4542 points for an average of 123 points per student. The fifth graders tallied 3105 points which translated to an average of 124 points per student. The fourth grade was also among the leaders with 3320 total points with an average of 119 points per student.

Next with 2047 points was the eighth grade with an average of 54 points per student. Second graders tallied 1549 points during the year for an average of 62 points. Third graders earned 1369 points (51 point average). The sixth grade amassed 1175 (45 average) points.

# iowa scores provide data for improvement

Each spring, Holy Angels students devote time and brain power over the course of two weeks to the completing of standardized tests. In 2018, students in grades 2, 3, 5, and 7 again took the Iowa Assessments (IA). This is a revision of the old Iowa Tests of Basic Skills (ITBS). These tests are one of many ways to determine student progress. The test scores also help the school in evaluating the effectiveness of the curriculum and instruction. Usually the results pose more questions rather than give answers. Regardless, it's interesting to see where Holy Angels stands using some kind of standardized measurement.

The school-wide results of the IA are given in percentiles. The scores indicate how the average Holy Angels student's score compares to the average score of students across the country. The percentile indicates the position of Holy Angels students in comparison with 100 sample students. Therefore a percentile of 75 means that the average Holy Angels student scored higher than 75 out of 100 students in the sample. The Cognitive Abilities Test (CogAT) is a measure of student ability, as opposed to student achievement measured on the IA. A comparison of these two percentiles can provide some information regarding the determination of whether or not students are working up to their ability.

As a point of reference, the Holy Angels composite percentiles can be compared to the non-Choice schools in the Milwaukee Archdiocese and the Catholic schools in Washington County. One way to determine how well students are achieving relative to their ability is to calculate a ratio of achievement to ability. The higher the ratio, the greater the achievement compared to ability (a ratio of 1.00 means that the percentile of achievement is equal to the percentile of ability). Here is the data (IA/CogAT) for Holy Angels, Washington County and the Milwaukee Archdiocese:

The scores are noticeably lower than in the past and it is suspected that the testing dates may have had an impact across the archdiocese. The assessments were taken right before Spring Break which was earlier than the previous year.

## athletics for fall: forms available online

Planning for the fall sports season is under way with the volleyball program again be associated with the Washington-Ozaukee Catholic Conference. Participating schools include: Holy Angels, St. Frances Cabrini, Port Catholic, St. Francis Borgia-Cedarburg, St. Joseph-Grafton, St. Kilian-Hartford, and St. Gabriel. Holy Angels will again have teams for 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th grade girls.

Holy Angels will be sponsoring the 21st annual Holy Angels Volleyball Classic during the week of October 22-27. This is an eight-team tournament for seventh grade and eighth grade teams. The Athletic Committee

hopes to provide another exciting tournament for our girls' teams.

Practices for this year's season will begin August 15th. There will be an important meeting for parents at the first practice. Parents of those who have signed up for volleyball will be notified regarding the date of the first practice.

All necessary forms will be available on the school website and completed forms must be on file before practices begin. Follow the School Links to Athletics to locate the forms. These include: Physical Exam Form (see related article), Parental Risk Acknowledgement Form, Medical Emergency Form, Sportsmanship Pledge (player and parent), and Concussion Form. Parents may want to talk to their

child's doctor about a baseline brain scan for concussion detection and treatment. The fee for girls volleyball is \$30.

During the upcoming volleyball season, admissions and concessions will again be combined with limited concessions. Parents of the team playing will be called upon to take care of the table.

Athletic Committee members for the 2018-19 school year will include: John Barnett (basketball), Scott Sadownikow (intramurals), Matt Ciriacks (booster), Amy Dahlberg (secretary), Tom Voelker (VB Classic), and Mitch Draxler (chairperson/BB Classic). # 21st century project coming to an end

The 21st Century Classrooms project got a jump start from several volunteers who showed up to take care of some of the moving of materials necessary for this summer's final Phase Three. During the next couple of months, here's what's in store...

The lavatories in the main hallway will get some attention with the installation of new partitions and new sinks. Stair treads will also be replaced throughout the building.

The really big work will be done in the library and computer lab! At this time, everything has been removed from both areas. ## sports exams needed

Students involved in inter-scholastic athletics are required to have a physical examination prior to participation in the athletic program. Generally these exams are good for two years. With the beginning of inter-scholastic participation in 5th grade, students will generally need a physical before 5th grade and again before 7th grade.

5th through 8th graders participating in fall volleyball will need their physical form on file before they are allowed to practice. Basketball participants will need a physical form on file by November 1st.

Forms are available in the school office and at the LINKS section of the school website.

It is suggested that appointments be made before the August rush. Be sure to have the doctor complete the Holy Angels Form. WIAA forms will not be accepted.

## keeping kids safe: being informed

In conjunction with the Archdiocese's efforts to protect children from abuse, all parish employees and volunteers who have regular contact with children must participate in the Safe Environment Education (SEE). The program had been called the Safeguarding All God's Family or VIRTUS training program. For volunteers, the program involves attending a three-hour training session and passing a criminal records check.

The training session is a one-time requirement for those who work with children. This includes activities such as field trip/event chaperone, classroom aide, coach, playground supervisor, and activity coordinator. We're hopeful that this requirement will not prevent parents from being involved with our students, but rather assure everyone's safety.
